

George Washington, Land Survey, 1749

Pursuant. To a Warrant from the Proprietors Office to Me directed I have Surveyed for Edward Hogan Three Hundred and thirty acres of Waste and Ungranted Land Situated Lying and being in the County of Augusta and on the Lost River or Cacapehon about Six miles with in the Boundary Line of the Northern Neck and Bounded as followeth

Beginning at a white Oak and white Pine Saplings on the West Side of the River and runs thence So ...60°.. Et Two hundred and Eighty Poles to three Chestnut Oaks on a steep Mountain Side thence No ...9 °... Et Two hund[red] and three Poles to three Pines on the same Mountain in thence No ... 60°..Wt Two hundred and Eighty Poles to two white Oaks in a Drain of the Mountain thence So ...2°.. Wt One hundred and thirty two Poles to two white Oakes thence So ... 22°... Wt Sixty Eight Poles to the Beginning this first Day of Novem[ber] 1749


